

Where We've Been Growing Our Roots in Rhode Island & Beyond

In 2023, working under the Rhode Island Department of Health's RPE grant, we made powerful strides in deepening our local impact — reaching more schools than we ever imagined and establishing SafeBAE as a key prevention partner in the region.

We delivered in-person programming at over 20 schools across Rhode Island, reaching more than 7,250 students face-to-face through assemblies, classroom sessions, and workshops.

We also partnered with the Coordinated Community Response (CCR) team at Sojourner House through their OVW grant to support prevention efforts at **Woonsocket High School** and **Smithfield High School**, contributing resources, posters, and content to strengthen school-based education and accountability structures.

This year reinforced what's possible when prevention is embedded early and locally. In 2024, we look forward to building on this success as we expand direct programming in New York — our next regional hub.

This year, we also presented at a number of conferences and professional gatherings, helping shape the conversation around youth leadership, mental health, and violence prevention. In total, we reached over 5,000 people through these presentations.

Rhode Island has become our regional hub, and this year proved what's possible when we're given the opportunity to go deep — not just wide. In 2024, we'll be building on this success by expanding our direct programming in New York, with the goal of scaling SafeBAE 360 and strengthening school partnerships across the state.

Our second year of expert training for student leaders

SafeBAE's full spectrum approach to engaging school communities in transformative culture, curriculum, practice, and policy change has impacted so many schools in the 2 years since we launched!

By framing teen dating violence prevention as a mental health intervention, we have been able to write grants and partner with several school districts to implement solutions that fit their individual school's needs. Each school begins where they most see the need for support and expands their programming as needed. Our goal is to provide school communities and staff with solutions that will sustain this work long after our support in initial implementation.

In collaboration with Lindsey Orchowski at Brown University, SafeBAE evaluated our program delivery at Rhode Island partner schools to track the impact on teachers' and young people's abilities to understand, respond to, and prevent sexual violence.

STUDENT IMPACT


Young people who took part in SafeBAE's programs were more prepared to engage in bystander intervention when they witnessed harmful or potentially harmful actions.

- 23% increase in participants attending an event or program about what you can do as a bystander to stop dating violence, sexual violence or stalking
- 18% increase in participants knowing how to find school policies about dating violence, sexual violence or stalking or been given a copy of the policies
- 17% increase in participants having a conversation with a teacher or administrator at my school about healthy relationships
- 10% increase in participants discussing the topic of dating violence, sexual violence or stalking with another student in their school
- 10% less likely to describe barriers to bystander intervention that would inhibit them from intervening if they saw harm occurring.
- 5% increase in participants having a conversation with another student about healthy relationships

EDUCATOR IMPACT

Teachers who took part in SafeBAE's programs were **more likely to believe that their school policies could protect students from violence and thoroughly respond if violence occurs**.

- 15% more teachers were likely to believe that students at their school would believe survivors of sexual violence following our programming.
- 9.4% more teachers were likely to believe that teachers and administrators would support survivors of sexual violence following our programming.

Taken collectively, our evaluation suggests that our uniquely intergenerational programs help young people and teachers become prepared to utilize interpersonal and administrative methods to support survivors of sexual violence.

Partner Perspective: Portland Public Schools

A systems-level partnership advancing prevention and student wellbeing

"The partnership with SafeBAE has been immensely helpful to the Portland Public Schools in multiple ways. First, we know from experience what the data in the recent *CDC Youth Risk Behavior Survey* report reveal, namely that teenagers, especially girls and LGBTQ+ young people, are experiencing an alarming increase in violence, mental and emotional distress, and suicide risk. The need for trauma-informed support and education on healthy boundaries and care for self and others is urgent. SafeBAE staff have been working closely with instructors at multiple schools to develop more robust and meaningful consent education, while also assisting efforts to empower students to be change-makers. We are grateful for their expertise in helping the district address the very concerns raised by the CDC report.

In addition to such programmatic support, SafeBAE has also been instrumental in bolstering our systemic work. PPS recently overhauled the district's policies and procedures for addressing discrimination and harassment, including sexual harassment, to be more trauma-informed. SafeBAE is helping us lean into these commitments by working with the school-based liaisons who are central to our new reporting and support structure. SafeBAE's direct engagement with liaisons is enabling us to build essential skills for identifying what students need to be safe and well and to connect students with resources for long-term support. Moreover, the district's new policy prioritizes the implementation of accountability practices whereby students learn what is necessary to take responsibility for repairing harm and preventing its recurrence. Access to SafeBAE's self-guided accountability training has been an important tool for us in putting these intentions into practice.

The partnership between SafeBAE and the Portland Public Schools is one that makes a lot of sense because of our shared commitment to be adaptive in how we meet the particular needs of young people today. With the wide-ranging pressures that school district's face, it is an extraordinary benefit to be able to rely on the expertise of an organization that is on the cutting edge of transformative work. We are lucky to be able to count on SafeBAE and would wish the same for other districts. They are building a model of support for schools and districts that can be scaled up to make a broad impact, which is both exciting and urgently necessary."

She shared her journey as a Fellow and encouraged participants to become Peer Educators and apply to the upcoming Summer Institute.



Dorie McNamara

Massachusetts, Age 15

Dorie worked directly with school administrators to create a SafeBAE-led orientation training for all incoming freshmen, resulting in our highest-ever signups for Peer Educator Training. She also founded and serves as president of her school's SafeBAE Club, hosting awareness events throughout the year to keep prevention conversations going.



Enetu Nelson

Rhode Island, Age 15

Enetu launched and led a SafeBAE Club at Paul Cuffee Charter School in Providence, serving as club president throughout the school year. She organized school-wide assemblies and awareness events, helping spark critical conversations and connect students to support and training opportunities.

Creating Cultures of Consent

In April 2023, during *Sexual Assault Awareness Month*, SafeBAE partnered with AsskFirst, a consent-themed apparel initiative founded by Ella Fairon, to launch a digital event series titled:

Consent Apparel with a Purpose

AsskFirst is a youth-led consent apparel brand that raises awareness, sparks dialogue, and helps fund prevention education. While independent from SafeBAE, the brand has continued to support our work through aligned collaborations and proceeds.

In 2023, AsskFirst partnered with several SafeBAE Summer Institute Fellows to codesign a limited collection of t-shirts and hats. The brand also hosted pop-up shops in New York and Los Angeles, using its platform to spotlight youth-led activism and fundraise for school-based programming.

With thousands of items sold across the country, AsskFirst is helping to build a culture of consent — one conversation (and design) at a time.
